A SPIRITUAL PILGRIMAGE

OUR LADY OF FATIMA

The year was 1917. The world was at war. World War I was raging. Twenty million killed and twenty-one million wounded. And Mary came to warn people that even worse atrocities were coming if humanity didn't change course.

Three Portuguese children were the recipients of visions and messages from Mary; Lucia, Francisco, and Jacinta; ages ten, nine, and seven. Fatima became the center of the world for many believers and they flocked from far and wide hoping to experience one of the miracles or speak with the children.

What was the message? It was an urgent call to conversion and penance. This is the simple way to state it. There were, of course, many aspects to the messages between May and October of 1917. Mary spoke about Heaven, Hell, Death, and Judgment (the Four Last Things). The messages included insights about sin and sacrifice, and a call to pray the rosary for peace in our families and peace in the world. And of particular significance here on our journey toward Eucharistic Consecration, Mary spoke to the children and the world about respect for the Eucharist.

LESSON: We are called to a continual conversion of the heart. Preparing to receive the Eucharist helps us to see ourselves as we really are. Receiving the Eucharist gives us the strength and courage needed to continually seek this conversion of the heart. Commit yourself not just to receiving Jesus in the Eucharist frequently but receiving Him we;;/

VIRTUE OF THE DAY: Fortitude: The virtue of fortitude is a moral virtue that ensures firmness in the face of difficulties and obstacles, and consistency in the pursuit of holiness. Deep, still waters in the soul are the gift of fortitude. This calmness of the soul is necessary to avoid getting carried away in the moment, and helps us to stay focused on our duties and commitments.

SPIRITUAL COMMUNION: Jesus, I believe that You are truly present in the Most Holy Sacrament of the Eucharist. Every day I long for more of You. I love You above all things, and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot receive You sacramentally at this moment, I invite You to come and dwell in my heart. May this spiritual communion increase my desire for the Eucharist. You are the healer of my soul. The blindness from my eyes, the deafness from my ears, the darkness from my mind, and the hardness from my heart. Fill me with the grace, wisdom, and courage to do Your will in all things. My Lord and my God, draw me close to You, nearer than ever before. AMEN.
